Brittany's Storytelling Tradition

2 lb (1 kg) new potatoes

4 tablespoons coriander leaves

6 tablespoons olive oil

I tablespoon red wine vinegar

Salt and pepper

I garlic clove peeled and crushed

Grated zest of one lemon

¼ teaspoon chilli sauce

1 oz (25 g) pine nuts

Handful of chives, chopped

Coriander sprigs to garnish

Method:

- 1. Wash the potaotes and cut into halves, or quarters, if large. Add to a large pan of boiling water, Boil until tender - 10 to 15 minutes.
- 2. Finely chop the coriander and add to a small bowl with 4 tablespoons of the olive oil, the red wine vinegar, and plenty of salt and pepper. Mix well and set aside.
- 3. Heat the remaining 2 tablespoons of oil in a large frying pan and add the crushed garlic, lemon zest, and hot sauce, and gently fry for about 3 minutes.
- 4. Add the cooked potatoes to the frying pan and mix in the coriander, vinegar and oil mixture. Turn off the heat and transfer to a large bowl.
- 5. Toast the pine nuts in a small frying pan and add to the potatoes, together with the chopped chives and a few coriander sprigs for garnish.

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


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4 Roses

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Breton: brulu French: digitale

The foxglove has been aptly called one of the loveliest flowers which grows in these parts. The splendid purple bell flowers, borne on long stalks, are seen at their most spectacular in June, but last well into July. Once the flowers are spent, they are replaced by the seed capsules, containing thousands of miniscule brown seeds; these are a favourite with small birds, which perch on the dead flower stalks and eat the contents of the capsules. However, foxgloves make such an abundance of seeds that there are enough for the birds and also ample for renewing its species. Once the seeds have germinated they must wait a whole year before they can flower, and it is not until the following summer that the familiar spikes of foxgloves are thrown up. After this the plant may die, or continue to grow fresh leaves and flowers the next year. Where found growing, a colony of foxgloves can be increased

by a little judicious weeding, and an area of bare earth, such as a half-filled flowerbed, when near a patch of foxgloves, will readily be sown by them - producing spectacular results after a couple of years.


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Morris Dancing

A group of Silurian Morrismen are due to viait Brittany in June and will be performing at "Les Fous" in Carnoet (see What On page 20). Morris dancing is a traditional English dance – probably sharing pre-Christian roots with Breton dancing. The Silurian' dances have been collected from towns and villages on the borders of England and Wales. Most of the dances are performed with multiples of four men, mainly with short sticks but occasionally with handkerchiefs Dancers traditionally wear black bowler hats, black trousers, and a white shirt with strips of coloured rags sewn on, and often blacken their faces. Each dancer then wears a coloured sash across his shirt, with a matching ribbon in the bowler hat and around his knees, to which the bells are attached. A group of Silurian Morrismen are due to visit Brittany in J

attached.
The origins of the blackened face are unclear, but are bell to be a form of disguise, possibly to escape prosecutio begging or perhaps to avoid "the timeless embarrassmabeing a Morris man".

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
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However, Brittany was also fortunate in attracting the interest of several dedicated story collectors who travelled to the homes of the most well-known storytellers, and translated their tales from Breton into French.

The most famous of these collectors are François Luzel, Anatole Le Braz, Émile Souvestre, Paul Sébillot, and François Cadic. Of these, Luzel's work has been the most influential, but originally the stories collected by François Cadic were perhaps the most popular. He was a Breton priest who found himself working in Paris in a parish that contained many emigrant workers from Brittany. In order to brighten the lives of these workers and their families, he produced a journal with news from home; whenever he had an opportunity, he would return to Brittany and collect stories to be featured in his magazine. Although much loved by their readers, the value of these stories did not receive the recognition that they deserved until they were collected into anthologies such as 'Contes et Légendes de Bretagne' which has made his work available to modern readers.

The brothers Grimm owed their success in part to their good fortune in finding an exceptionally good story teller, but also to the fact their published stories were as close to the originals as possible - they did very little to 'improve' them.


"We had the good fortune to know, in the village of Niederzwehren, near to Kassel, a peasant woman called Frau Katherina Viehmann, to whom we owe the most beautiful stories of our second volume. She remembered all the old tales perfectly and admitted that this ability was not given to everyone, and that many people were unable to retain them. She told them composedly, without hesitation, and with extraordinary animation; you could see that she took extreme pleasure in it; when asked, she could repeat these tales slowly enough for us to write them down as she spoke."

Facing Page: The Gorge du Korong near Locarn is famous for the huge granite boulders which fill the floor of the valley.



14 Brittany's Storytelling Tradition

The phenomenon of people challenging the storyteller on their plausiblility, is not a new one, hence this traditional way of beginning a story:



Once upon a time, Near to a forest filled with wood, But it was when? And it was where? Why concern yourself with such things?



The travelling tailor was very often a renowned storyteller. His coming was eagerly awaited by the women, children and the old folk of the farm, who would sit round and listen to his tales, songs and anecdotes, while the men of the family were out in the fields.

In his notes, François Cadic gives an insight into the practical difficulties of collecting stories, providing a clue as to why many old stories have been lost

When visiting a stroyteller, it is not always easy to rouse them. Very often, they are instinctively wary of the 'Monsieur', or the stranger. Their self-pride shrinks from the idea that their tales could be laughed at. But when you put them at their ease, when you win their trust, when they feel that in your manner there is not only deference, but also interest, the ice is broken, and they pour forth the treasures of their imagination."

Korrigans

In this extract from the fairy story "Mélénik and Petit Colin", a girl out walking at night with her dog, comes across a group of little men, or korrigans. The girl's name is Mélénik (Little Golden Hair), and the name of her dog is Petit

The moon, which had been hidden by great clouds, came out, and by its pale light Mélénik saw a clearing in the forest, in which there was a ring of little people. They were holding hands and dancing round a menhir that stood in the middle of the clearing. As they

danced they sang the same song again and again:

Dilun, Dimerh, Dimerher. (Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday).

Mélénik came to a standstill. She did not dare to go on, but it was already too late to turn back. The little dancers had surrounded her, and they were calling to her to come and dance with them.

Her little dog, Petit Colin, whispered to her what to do:

"Add these words to their song, Dirieu ha diguéner éue" Mélénik obeyed, and started to sing:

> Dilun, Dimerh, Dimerher, Dirieu ha Diguéner éué.

(Monday, Tuesday Wednesday Thursday and Friday too.)

At these words the dancers stopped, and the singers looked at her with wonder.


"What gift can we give this child?" they cried. "She has taught us such beautiful new words. Let gold and silver pieces fall to the ground every time she brushes her hair, and may she be blessed with great wealth.' The wish was soon granted. No sooner had Mélénik arrived

home, and unfastened her hair, but gold and silver pieces came tumbling to the floor, and soon the whole room was filled with them."

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This description is of the blind musician, Jacques Coinéc, who lived in the commune of Noyal-Pontivy.

"As soon as he was sighted, being led by his wife, the young folk surrounded him: 'Come, Dal,' they cried, 'quick - play us a song to make us dance.' In a moment, the Muse had whispered in his ear. His stirring tones rose up, the fiddle went at it hell for leather, and the couplets went on and on, each more amusing than the last. The dancers had to beg for mercy, before the old man came to an end of his inspiration."

In this extract, François Cadic describes how people entertained themselves during the long winter evenings before the advent of electricity and television.

"Barely had the biting cold of Winter set in but the long evenings arrived, and the time of storytelling began. Not all the houses were considered appropriate for the gatherings but in each town and village there was one or several houses favoured by the storytellers. Some gatherings - which the rector was forever condemning drew the young folk who wanted to laugh and make merry; others were preferred by the storytellers, singers, and lovers of the fabulous.

As soon as the farm work was finished, when the animals had been given their fodder, young men and girls, as well as older folk, set out for the designated meetingplace. By nine o'clock everyone had arrived. Usually we assembled in the main room, everyone settling down where he liked, on a chair, a bench, on the hearth or the bread bin, around an enormous fire of huge logs; sometimes, too, we assembled in the stable, in the midst of the fresh straw. A candle in the wall illumined the scene, while the animals drowsed around us, sweetening the atmosphere with their

If tongues wagged, hands were not idle; young girls knitted or spun; women worked at the spinning wheel; men peeled heather for the horses, or plaited straw to make hats, or broom to make bee hives. Chestnuts were roasted and the cider was passed round and round, either in jugs or bowlfuls.

Jokes flew about, riddles were exchanged, practical jokes retold. Only if the chatter took a scurrilous turn, did the master or mistress of the house interpose to exert their authority.

After this, the most celebrated story-tellers were given their turn. Towards midnight, the master of the house brought an

end to the gathering. A short prayer was said, in which the dead were specially remembered, and the company returned singing to their homes." François Cadic 1914

"The fiddle-singer is rarely in the village of his birth, for he travels ceaselessly up hill and down dale, telling his stories, and singing his songs.

Paul Sébillot gives an insight into the sort of society in which storytelling thrives. Cornouaille is the area at the South West corner of Brittany, around Quimper.

"When I lived in Cornouaille, I was often witness to the gaiety and good humour of the people of Cornouaille. I have seen women on the seashore, in the height of Summer, who had come to cut the wheat or to bind the sheaves, start to dance beneath the bright noonday sun, and to sing joyful songs. In other regions, and it is almost the rule in Upper Brittany, most outdoor work is done with the greatest good humour, they sing, give tuneful cries and calls, and exchange many quips and other pleasantries. In the evenings, the most popular stories are those which contain the comic element... Stories from which the marvellous is absent, charm their listeners no matter what their age, quite as much as those tales in which the marvellous is the chief attraction. These stories are told not only in the evenings, but also in the middle of the countryside, when the workers or haymakers are sitting in the shade to rest; and on board the fishing boats or sailing vessels which travel on the open sea, between the sea and the sky.

In the home, they enliven the farmers of an evening, as they sit busy with some trifling work in a corner of the hearth, and also the spinners and the housewives, and the fishermen, as they prepare their craft for the sea. Old women tell them to children to keep them quiet at home, and also sometimes to impart a sort of moral

lesson or example." Paul Sébillot 1843-1918

Should we regret the passing of this storytelling culture?

Where there are people there will always be stories worth telling - something that the old storytellers understood was that there is nothing more interesting than the story of a human life - and it is not the fact that many of the old stories have been lost or forgotten that should cause us concern; the problem is that we no longer seem to have time to tell stories or to listen to them. Perhaps the passing of the old storytelling culture should not be seen as something to be regretted, but rather as an opportunity to slow down a little, to start to tell stories of our own, and to inspire the beginning of a new storytelling tradition.



"Yes father," said the Prince.


"In that case you must marry her."

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Jacques Cambry

Travels in Brittany 1794

In 1794 a government official, Jacques Cambry, made a tot on horseback of the region of Finistère. The book he wrote describing his travels is one of the chief sources of information on life in Brittany two hundred years ago. In this extract, Cambry describes what he has witnessed of the music and dances of Brittany.

"I do not think that I have mentioned the dances and the music of the Bretons.

Their music is lively and light-hearted, and really does not seem to belong to a race of people naturally rather heavy and whose movements are slow.

The instruments in use in Brittany are the accordion, the oboe and the drum. No race has a better ear than the people of these parts. In the dance of a hundred people you will not see one who steps out of time, or spoils by a wrong step, the measure of a dance.

Sometimes they walk two by two, until the music tells them to turn into the circle; sometimes they form a great ring, in the middle of which they place a child; now they release their neighbour's hand and walk out a hundred patterns, followed by all the dancers, according to their fancy. One thing in particular strikes one as strange and unusual, and that is the humble manner, the lowered eyes, the devout manner of all the women: it is that special respect which dance used to inspire when it mirrored the movement of the heavens, and took place in temples, and in the heart of sacred woods.'

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Gardening & Soil Quality

Reasons for growing your own vegetables include the fact that home-grown vegetables taste better

Reasons for growing your own vegetables include the fact that home-grown vegetables taste better and are fresher than shop-bought vegetables, you know what has been used to produce them and they are virtually free. Added to this is the fact that vegetable gardening is fun, wins the respect of friends and neighbours, and produces an untaxable product that can often be used in place of hard currency.

The essence of vegetable gardening is, however, soil quality. In days gone by, people in Brittany invested great amounts of time and energy in improving the soil close to their homes in order to maximise the quality and quantity of their vegetable crops. This involved composting large amounts of vegetation cut from the banks and uncultivated areas, adding animal manures, crop rotation, and care in working the soil. Over the course of many years, this careful treatment led to the creation of rich soil, capable of yielding very high crops of vegetables such as potatoes, cabbages, tomatoes, leeks, onions, pumpkins, marrows, etc.

The advantages that this sort of soil, which is rich in organic matter and soil organisms, has over the soil that has been treated with inorganic fertilisers, weedkillers, fungicides, pesticides, etc. include: It is better draining, so that seeds, seedlings, and tubers are less likely to rot in the ground during cold wet periods in the Spring and early Summer. It retains water better, helping plants to maintain continuous growth during dry spells in the hot Summer months.

It encourages healthy root growth, which improves the overall health of the plants and helps them to withstand winds and to over-winter better.

It provides plants with the right balance of nutrients, allowing the plant to follow a natural



growth pattern and helping it to be resistant to attack by pests and diseases.

It provides food for a wider variety of birds and insects, which in turn help to stop the numbers of any particular pest from getting out of control.

How to Achieve this Kind of Soil

It is possible to convert farmland into a vegetable garden, but it is a mistake to imagine that it can be done overnight – in practice it takes many years of mulching and adding compost to the soil, to re-establish healthy soil conditions after a plot of land has been subjected to a period of chemical farming or gardening. This is probably not due so much to chemical residues remaining in the soil as to the fact that a healthy soil is so complex that it takes many years for all the different types of inter-dependant bacteria, insects, worms, fungi, etc. to become re-established, and then several more years for their numbers to be built up through careful addition of organic material.

Thus, if you are looking for relatively quick results, it may be better to establish your vegetable garden on an area which has not been cultivated for several years, and which will therefore already have a natural balance of organisms in the soil. Unfortunately, modern methods of bringing an area into cultivation tend to destroy the existing

soil structure and reduce it to the same condition as land that has been farmed for many years: ploughing the land turns the top few inches of the soil deep underground, burying all the organisms that you ought to be fostering, and the practice of spraying with weed-killer devastates soil life.

The aim should be to remove the existing vegetation with the minimum amount of soil disturbance. This can be done with the help of this tried and tested 3 year programme.

Year 1: Select an area for a vegetable garden. Cut the vegetation to the ground two or three times over the course of the summer, and pile it up in the middle of the plot. Turn these piles of vegetation from time to time. Once the vegetation has stopped growing spread these piles of semi-composted material over the plot as a mulch.

Year 2: In the early Spring, rake the mulch back into piles and dig trenches for potatoes. Dig the trenches out to around one foot deep. Take out any large roots that you come across — docks, nettles, bracken, brambles, etc. In April, fill the trenches with the material that you used as a mulch over the winter. Plant potatoes on top of the mulch and cover over with soil, removing as many of the weed roots as possible. Earth up the potatoes every couple of weeks during May and June. Harvest the potatoes as soon as the tops die back. Hoe the ground and plant either with a green manure, such as mustard, or with winter cabbage plants. Mulch the ground in the winter.

Year 3: The garden should now be free of weeds, and ready for growing whatever you wish.

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Hoverflies


Hoverflies are aptly named, for the easiest way to recognise them is by the way they hover. They are harmless insects, without a sting, and the way they protect themselves from birds is by mimicking the colourings of insect which do have stings, such as bees and wasps. They reach maturity just after the young birds have learnt that black and yellow stripes are a warning of danger.

But this security measure has the opposite effect when it comes to humans, who often swat hoverflies

mistaking them for wasps. The difference between the two, however, is easily learnt. Wasps buzz loudly, bump into things, and try to land on food, whereas hoverlies will zoom out of the door or window if given the chance. Some hoverfly larvae eat aphids, thereby making them welcome insects in the garden.









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
