

PROGRAMME

GENERAL:

On each morning lectures will be given in accordance with the Programme at 9-45 and 11-30. Coffee will be available during the "break" between the lectures.

2. These are held each evening at 5-30 p.m. under the direction of one of the Lecturers. Students are arranged in groups before the Course begins, according to the interests which they have noted on their Application Forms, their seniority, etc. Among the subjects of the Seminars will be: "Some Difficult Poems," "The Present State of Yeatsian Scholarship," "The Later Plays," "Last Poems," "Yeats' Sequences." There will also be introductory Seminars for reading and discussion of selected poems and plays.

It is possible for students to transfer from one Seminar to

It is possible for students to transfer from one Seminar to another, subject to limitations of space. An "Open Seminar" will also be arranged in connection with one of the morning lectures, for those who would like further discussion with the Lecturer.

On one evening in each week there will be an opportunity for open discussion in the form of a "Brains Trust" for which students send in written questions.

- 3. The afternoons will generally be free of teaching activities so that students may take part in the various expeditions which are planned.
- 4. On certain evenings there will be Irish Dancing and Music at the Social Centre which will be open to all members of the School. Refreshments will be available.

BOOKS:

5. A Working Bibliography will be issued to all Students on arrival. But since many will be "travelling light" the only essential books are copies of the Collected Poems and the Collected Plays (Macmillan), which will be used in Seminars.
6. Times will be arranged at which members of the Lecturing Staff will be available for consultation regarding theses, essays, or other "work in progress."

ADMINISTRATION:

Members of the administrative staff will be available for consultation and advice at specified hours.






