






St Aubin Past & Present







The first pier was constructed in the late 17th century at the small islet, with a wharf built of immense stones. A 16th century tower with cannon protected the islet and more gun batteries were added during the English Civil war. The 18th century saw fortified ramparts for a garrison.

Privateering was a major activity during the English Civil War when the Royalist cause was supported by the licensing of local ships to attack and capture enemies of the King Cargo from these attacks were sold off following judgement by an Admiralty Court, probably giving 'The Old Court House Inn', its name.

Major changes began in the 18th century when land was reclaimed to create a wharf known as The Bulwarks. The south arm of the harbour was started and later extended, and the north pier was completed in 1819. However, the harbour soon silted up, and the trade favoured the new harbour in St Helier.

Within a few decades, steam was taking over from the age of sail, and eventually St Aubin became a place of leisure and pleasure boating. Photographs of the famous yacht Westward can be seen in the bar at The Old Court House, and other artefacts are on display at the Maritime Museum, St Helier.





# The Parish Hall

St Aubin is not one of the twelve parishes. It lies within the Parish of St Brelade, and is home to the Parish Hall and Police Station, an impressive building which stands facing the harbour. Here is the office of the elected Connétable (Constable or 'mayor') who represents the parish in the Island's government, the States of Jersey

The Constable is head of all Parish administration, including a number of elected honorary officers (Centeniers, Vingteniers and Constable's Officers) who act as police and officiate in various parish matters.

# The Market

A growing population and garrison soldiers demanded that a market place be provided. By 1771 a market was established, rebuilt in 1826 and then redeveloped, to accommodate the railway track, in 1884. Today half the building remains, rebuilt with its pillared façade and now occupied by NatWest Bank.

In the end of the building an unusual money-box, a collecting box for the poor, is built in to the stonework. No longer in use, it is a reminder of another age, when the wealthy were reminded of those less fortunate.

# The Railway

From 1870 steam trains ran around the coast, linking St Aubin with St Helier. The railway was extended in 1884, first to La Moye granite quarries, to fetch stone for export, and then to La Corbière and its famous lighthouse


The Parish Hall is housed in the former railway station hotel. This splendid building opened as St Christopher's Hotel in 1871, later becoming the Terminus Hotel. It has been the Parish Hall since 1948. As part of the terminus of The Jersey Railway a domed canopy stood over the station at the rear where today cars are parked.

In 1936 a fire in the station destroyed much of the rolling-stock as well as the station building. The disaster finally brought Jersey's railway system to a close.

Look out for two stout granite pillars which remain against the wall. The new section of track passed close to the building and they were placed there to prevent the trains from hitting the building as they slowly rocked when they made the tight turn to climb the hill

Today the Railway Walk is a delightful wide pathway, a linear park lined with trees, which links St Aubin and Corbiere, where the famous lighthouse stands. See page 16.

Start your stroll at the Parish Hall next to the harbour, you might see some of the locals; ducks, brent geese and a variety of other migratory birds.


Cross over the road to NatWest Bank, and continue along The Bulwarks. The modern front of The Tenby conceals a former shipping-yard where today you can sit in the sun. Behind the Methodist Church is Le Quai Bisson, where the old chapel and former Sunday School is aligned with old warehouses which today shelter new occupants. St Aubin's Methodist Church, built in 1867, has a beautifully restored interior. It also provides a venue for occasional concerts.

It was in St Aubin that the first Methodists broke away from the established Anglican Church. Seamen returning from fisheries on the Canadian coast in the late 18th century brought back the new 'method' of worship learnt from missionaries sent from Bristol. Early converts suffered initial persecution, but despite this the new sect flourished throughout Jersey.

Carry on and you will pass the Harbour Gallery, the island's largest selling and exhibiting gallery and home to working artists.

Continue to the The Old Court House Inn, once a favourite with TV detective Jim Bergerac, and older than most of its neighbours. A little further on and you'll find The Royal Channel Islands Yacht Club, the sixth oldest yacht club in the world, and the slipway that leads across the sands to the fort causeway, accessible at low tide.

This once sandy beach, Belcroute Bay, has been nicknamed 'Pebble Beach' since stone spoil from the wartime tunnels was dumped here, to be smoothed by time and tide. The view from this corner across Belcroute Bay is tranquil. It is difficult to imagine the fleet sailing back from the Canadian Cod fisheries, or the cannon placed among the trees on the far point to protect Royalist interests during the English Civil War. The manor house of Noirmont dating back to medieval times is out of sight in the corner of the bay.

St Aubin's Fort

At the bottom of the steeply winding hill, Mont du Boulevard, is another merchant's house on the opposite corner to The Royal C.I. Yacht Club. The hill leads to the Somerville Hotel, and on up to Noirmont and Portelet. On the corner, Ivy House was once the home of photographer and artist Malcolm Arbuthnot whose distinctive work including sculpture can be seen in the Gallery at the Jersey Museum, St Helier Note also the raised entrance steps and porch – many of St Aubin's houses have this feature to provide access to storage cellars underneath.

Follow the road to the right, behind the Somerville Hotel, to return to the centre of St Aubin via Market Hill (Rue au Moestre), and remember that this was once the only road and The Bulwarks stand where the tide line used to be! There are some narrow steps between the buildings on the right leading back down to the harbour. At the foot of the hill on the left is La Poste, where the Post Office was run by the Smith family for about 100 years. Today, Murray's — the internet café around the corner opposite the Parish Hall — provides modern communication.

Take the first left at the bottom of Market Hill and head up the Railway Track that runs parallel to the main road, Mont les Vaux. The wartime tunnels are now used for storage and are home to Jersey Cycle Tours. Follow the pedestrianised track until you see a fine granite signpost. Opposite is the old Parish Elementary School which is now used as a private college teaching English as a second language to students from other parts of the world

Cross over the road and follow the pavement down the hill back towards the harbour. Down the hill, on the left, is the church of St Aubin on the Hill, an elegant 'new' Anglican church built in 1892 as a replacement for the 18th century Chapel of Ease. Local merchants built it to save themselves the long journey over the hill to the Parish Church at St Brelade's Bay.

Note the windows; look for one in the tiny side chapel by the Pre-Raphaelite artist Sir Edward Burne-Janes and the large west window depicting the wedding feast at Cana by Henry Thomas Bosdet.

The road passes the old Harbour Pump dated 1862 where seafarers could collect water for their voyages and beyond the church, beside the main road, a granite stone records the site of the medieval watermill, Le Moulin Desgoutesplie.

Opposite is St Aubin's Institute, the gift of local magistrate Jurat Le Gros. The large date-stone of 1827 records the initials of former constable, Jacques Remon and his wife





# Discover St Aubin's historic past

Turn left at the Trafalgar Tavern, where Karl
Marx once stayed, and into the High Street.
Also called La Rue du Crocquet, it leads over
the 'Crocquet', or promontory, that blocked off
St Aubin from the east before the coast road was
built in 1844. Many of the village's oldest houses
are in this street.

Some of St Aubin's most famous sons and daughters were born or lived here including Charles Robin, one of the most successful merchants in the cod trade, Jean Janvrin, a formidable privateer and Jean Martel of brandy fame.

Continue up the hill where there is a superb viewing point at the top (notice the Victorian post-box, one of the first in the world, just beyond) and down to the main road

Turn right and cross the road with care. La Haule
Manor Hotel, a former Seigneurie (the manor
house of a feudal lord) of the estate of Franchef is
one of the oldest manors in the island and now a
hotel. With the present house built in 1796, it has
belonged to the same family since 1513 and was
an ammunition store for St Aubin's fort in the 16th
century. Lucas Bros. a busy farm shop and florist
can be found behind the manor at La Haule Farm.

The hotel stands opposite a slipway with raised cobbles that gave horses grip when bringing cart-loads of seaweed from the beach. Called 'vraic', seaweed is still used to fertilise the fields. On the slipway is Crusoe's Cabin, a popular stop off for refreshments, and during the warmer months a variety of sea sports are offered by the Jersey Sea Sport Centre.

Take the promenade and follow the sea wall to The Roman Catholic Church of the Sacred Heart overlooking the bay. It takes its name from the school in St Aubin run by Belgian nuns a century ago. Built in the late 1930s of rose coloured granite, the stone mason Joseph Le Guyader created the design of the anchor beneath the clock face. This was an act of compassion when the battleship 'Graf Spee' was sunk in 1939.

It is difficult to imagine that the whole of the seafront, including the area of the Parish Hall was once the sea-shore. As time went by, land was reclaimed along the shore and used for shipbuilding, and then built up to create the road.

Continue to the Parish Hall and enjoy a refreshing drink or something to eat. See page 18 –19.

# Parking

Parking is available in St Aubin and at various car parks close to the promenade starting at St Helier. Payment by paycards is required for parking wherever the paycard symbol is displayed. A parking disc may be used as an alternative in some parking areas and this should be set to show your arrival time.
