Anne of Brittany

Ingredients:

6 oz (175 g) unbleached white flour T80

1 oz (30 g) icing sugar

½ teaspoon baking powder 4 oz (125 g) butter, or margarine, cut into cubes

1 egg, beaten

1 tablespoon (15 ml) cold water

Mix the dry ingredients together. Add the butter or margarine, and rub together with your fingertips until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs.

Add the beaten egg and the water and mix well. Press together into a ball and place in the fridge to chill for 20 - 30 minutes.

Filling

Ingredients:

2½ oz (70 g) sugar

31/2 oz (110 g) softened butter or margarine

11/2 oz (45 g) powdered almonds

2 tablespoons water

3 tablespoons flour

Raspberry or blackcurrant jam (or jelly)

1 lb (500 g) fresh raspberries

Method:

1. In a small bowl, mix together the softened butter and the sugar. Cream well.

Add the powdered almonds, the water and the flour. Mix until smooth.

Grease a glass dish and place the pastry in it. Press flat with your fingers, so that the pastry covers the base and forms a crust around the edge. Pour in the almond paste and spread it evenly over the pastry. Place in an oven gas mark 5 (190°C, 350°F) for 30 minutes, or Webb's Of Glomel

until golden brown.

Leave to cool on a wire rack.

Spread with jam and arrange the raspberries on top. Dust with icing sugar and serve.



The legendary Brocéliande forest lies in the region of Paimpont, south west of Rennes. The forest covers an area of 18,000 acres. It is mostly wooded but also displays moorland, standing stones and fairy-inhabited rivers!


Everyone is familiar with the legendary King Arthur, Merlin, Lancelot and the Lady of the Lake, and the myths surrounding these wonderful characters. The legends change from area to area: in Tintagel (Cornwall) Merlin was trapped in a cave by his lover Nimue; in Brittany, Merlin's amour Vivian locked him in a standing-stone alignment.

Merlin's tomb forms part of an alignment of standing stones in the northern part of the forest. It is possible to visit the tomb if you can find it – the forest is not well signposted!

There are so many legends concerned with Merlin and Arthur: they lived in Wales, Tintagel, Wiltshire and Brittany. I think it is up to you to choose the story which holds the most truth for you, because that is what it is all about: legend and myth, never to be uncovered, I think that is the magic! So Brocéliande hides many magical places which are yours to discover, if you can...



Brittany's Departments



One of the first innovations introduced at the time of the Revolution was to divide France up into departments. Brittany was divided into five departments, one of which the Loire Atlantique, which includes the old capital of Brittany, Nantes - was removed during the Second World War.

The departments are listed alphabetically and assigned a number accordingly - thus Côtes d'Armor is twenty second on the list and Morbihan is fifty sixth.

From a purely administrative point of view the departments have been a great success. For example, they have enabled each property in France to be given a beautifully concise and accurate address, the first two digits of the five digit post codes designate the department.

In terms of the economy of Central Brittany, however, they have not been helpful. Towns such as Carhaix, Gourin, Rostrenen, Guémené, Pontivy, etc., have much more in common with each other than they have with the departmental headquarters of Quimper, St. Brieuc, and Vannes, but the administrative system has, in the past, made it difficult for the people of these towns to work directly with each other.

The current situation undoubtedly presents business opportunities to anyone

Systems of communication specifically dedicated to serving Central Brittany are probably a prerequisite for an economic revival in the region.



Anne of Brittany, known as the 'little | in Clogs' is regarded as being the last Brittany as an independent state. She two successive French kings - Charles Louis XII - and as the Duchess Queen plays a leading role in European politics. In Britany she is remembered with affection as being one of the few rulers of her time who had the interests of ordinary people at heart.

Brittany in the Middle Ages

In the fourteen hundreds the most stable institution in Brittany was still its church. Nominally under the control of the archbishop of Tours, the Breton church was largely independent, with its own culture and traditions dating back a thousand years to the time of the Breton

The country was divided into the seven diocese which owed their origins to the founding saints - Leon (St. Pol), Cornouaille (St. Corentin), Treguier (St. Tugdual), St. Brieuc or Penthièvre (St. Brieuc), Dol (St. Samson), St. Malo (St. Malo), Vannes (St. Patern) - plus the diocese of Rennes and Nantes, which were added to Brittany by its first king, Nominoë. Europe was still living under a feudal system of government, and in Brittany, power, at least in theory, lay with the Duke, supported by the principal nobles. The Duke in turn owed allegiance to the King of France and the King of France swore allegiance to the Pope.

By the time that Anne was born this system of government was breaking down: the power of the church was in decline, and the barons were openly competing with each other for wealth and status, making it difficult for the Duke to maintain the rule of law. A similar process was happening all over Europe, and it was being resolved by monarchs breaking free from Church control and establishing sovereign states, over which they were the supreme rulers.

Prior to this, the borders between different European countries had been fairly vague. In fact, the state of Brittany had been one of the more well-defined areas of the continent, having borders that had remained intact for seven hundred years. For the previous centuries, however, Brittany had only managed to maintain its independence through complex diplomacy that involved playing France and England off against each other. The biggest threat to peace usually came from France, because of the shared border, and for this reason, Brittany

tended to side with England in the disputes between the two countries. However, there were also vivid memories of occasions during the Hundred Years War (between France and England) when English soldiers had been invited over as allies and had ended up acting as conquerors: the main object of state policy was, therefore, to keep both powers at bay.

The Importance of Brittany

The subsequent history of Europe has served to obscure the importance of Brittany in the Middle Ages: in terms of its size and wealth it was at least as important as areas that have developed into independent countries, such as the Netherlands, Belgium, Portugal, or Denmark, and in terms of its strategic importance it was second to none.

Brittany was the hub of a trading network that linked the countries of southern Europe with those in the North. It is estimated that by the end of the fifteenth century the Breton merchant fleet consisted of 2000 ships, having a total capacity of 20,000 tons. They supplied Britain, the Netherlands, and the Baltic states with wines from Bordeaux, sugar from Madeira, fruit from Portugal, and iron from the Basque country; in addition, home-produced products such as salt from Guerande, linen from the Quintin/Loudéac area, canvas for ships' sails, and ropes made from hemp were sold extensively across northern Europe. The area around St. Brieue also produced a large surplus of wheat that was exported south to Spain and Portugal.

At this point in history, trade was beginning to challenge agriculture in economic importance. This meant that power was shifting from the countryside to the towns and from the old aristocracy to the new bourgeoisie. Brittany was one of the most significant trading nations on the continent and therefore an object of interest to its most powerful rulers. To a certain extent, it was Anne of Brittany's misfortune to have been born as the heir to the duchy of Brittany at this critical time

Anne's Life

Anne was the eldest daughter of François II, Duke of Brittany. She had one younger sister, Isabeau; their mother died when Anne was only eight years old.

Her father had more or less given up hope of having a legitimate male heir by the time that Anne was born, and she was therefore brought up as the heir apparent (under the famous Salic Law that applied in France, women could not inherit their father's titles, but under the Celtic law that applied in Brittany, Anne could become 'Duchess of Brittany'). As a baby, she was nursed by a woman from the west of Brittany, from whom she learnt Breton, and it was possibly from this early experience that she acquired her understanding of, and affection for, the ordinary people of the Duchy. Her education was similar to that received by princes of the age: she studied French, Latin, Greek, Hebrew, natural science and mathematics, in addition to the 'womanly' arts of music, dancing, poetry, and embroidery. Above everything else, she learnt the art of statecraft, being instructed in all the laws, treaties and alliances appertaining to the state of Brittany. From the age of eight or nine years old, she appears to have been the principal confidante of her father as he struggled to hold back the tide of events that threatened to overwhelm him.

In reality, François was trying to maintain control over a state that was falling apart - largely due to internal divisions and the fact that many of the nobles were openly in league with the French court, whose principal object of foreign policy at that time was to annex Brittany to France.

François's army lost a decisive battle at St. Aubin du Cormier in July 1488, and he died a few months later.

For many years his plan had been for Anne to marry the eldest son of Edward IV, king of England and Wales. If this marriage had taken place then, for a while at least, Brittany would have been united with England rather than with France, but all hope of such an alliance

perished with the young prince, who was one of the brothers murdered in the tower of London (an act which is commonly believed to have been carried out under the instructions of their uncle, Richard of York). After this, Anne had been variously engaged to another twelve different noblemen and heads of state as her father had struggled to protect both her future, and that of the Duchy, but in the end he died with nothing having been resolved.

It is now known that the people whom he appointed to advise and to act as regents for his daughter were themselves in receipt of bribes from the French court, and, to make matters worse, each of the principal nobles of Brittany refused in turn to aid Anne, unless she first agreed to marry them or a member of their family.

Anne appears to have been aware of all the dangers that beset her, and, even though only eleven years old, she took charge of her own affairs from the start. She succeeded in making a tour of Brittany even though many areas were in a state of civil war, and it is from this expedition that her reputation for kindness and taking an interest in the affairs of ordinary people dates: the name 'Duchess in Clogs' relates to an incident (which may or may not have happened) when she accepted a pair of clogs offered to her by a man in Rennes so that she could cross a muddy street without soiling her shoes.

She managed to keep the opposing forces at bay for two years as she tried to decide what course of action would be in the best interests of her country. She eventually settled for a marriage with the Emperor of Austria, Maximilien, which was to have been supported by a military alliance between Brittany, England and Austria (which at that time controlled the Netherlands), and was designed to thwart the ambitions of the French court.

The marriage took place by proxy (in a bizarre ceremony, the Austrian ambassador put his naked leg into Anne's bed in the full view of her advisors and courtiers to symbolise a consummation of the marriage), and when news of it came to the ears of Anne de Beaujeu, regent to the French king, Charles VIII, retribution was swift. Such a marriage was in clear contravention of previous treaties between Brittany and France, and the French army moved in to Brittany and laid siege to Rennes, where Anne was holding her court.

The hoped for aid from abroad did not arrive in sufficient strength, and the nobles of Brittany failed to come to her aid. It was not long before Anne was forced to surrender. She agreed to have her marriage with Maximilien annulled and to marry Charles VIII of France instead. She was then fourteen years old.

Charles and Anne had four children, but none of them survived and Charles himself died seven years after they were married, after banging his head on a door post.

Under the terms of her wedding contract, Anne had agreed to marry the heir to the French throne if Charles died before her, and if they had had no male children. She was thus pledged to marry Louis Duke of Orléans – Louis XII of France. It is possible that she was not unduly opposed to this marriage; Louis was cousin to her father and for a while had lived at the Breton court in Nantes. In addition, he had proved himself to be sympathetic to the Breton cause, even to the extent of fighting amongst the Breton infantry at the battle of St. Aubin du Cormier, an act for which he had been kept in prison for many years afterwards by Anne de Beaujeu.

Under the terms of the marriage between Anne and Louis, the union of France and Brittany was to have been only temporary. Anne's first male child was to have become King of France, and a second son would have become Duke of Brittany. However, Anne and Louis did not have any sons, but two daughters, Claude and Renée.

Under French law Claude could not inherit her father's title and the French crown was therefore due to pass to Louis's nearest male relative, François de Angoulême, Claude



Louis the eleventh, Charles VIII's father, is the French king who is regarded to have done the most to undermine the state of Brittany. Up until his time there were still the remnants of a code of honour amongst the leaders of Europe, which meant that they respected each other's rights and privileges.

Louis even had a plan to make himself Duke of Brittany. He went to the extent of purchasing rights of succession to the Duchy from a branch of the Breton nobility (rights which would never have stood up in a court of law but which had sufficient validity to make life difficult for Anne when her father died).

Louis died before he was able to carry through his plan but his baughter, Anne de Beaujeu, continued his policy and in her role as regent of your young brother. Charles VIII, she paid large bribes to Anne of Brittany's tutor, Françoise de Dinan, to her guardian, Jean de Rieux, and to many members of the family of Rohan, who were perhaps the most powerful of the Breton nobles at that time.



would, however, become Duchess of Brittany and it was Anne's wish that she should marry the Duke of Luxembourg, so that Brittany would once again become independent of France - a move that was clearly opposed to the interests of everyone else at the French court.

Anne fell ill after a failed pregnancy and died two years later at the age of thirty-seven. After her death, Claude was married to François and, like her mother, became Queen of France. However, she lacked Anne's interest in state affairs and was happy for her husband to administer Brittany as part of his larger domains which now stretched as far as northern Italy. Different people have chosen to look at the life of Anne of Brittany in different ways:

- two countries united through the union of two hearts etc.; some Breton historians, on the other hand, have portrayed her as the helpless victim of French aggression, and others have even suggested that she sold her heritage for a life of luxury.

Students of human nature see in Anne a rare example of a person of integrity born into a time and place where morals had fallen into decline; a young person who, though virtually destitute of any help or support from her elders, still strove to remain true to what she believed to be right; and someone whose virtues and merits are still remembered with affection by the people of Brittany today, even though she herself may have felt that she failed to accomplish the task that she set out to achieve.



Life for Ordinary People in Brittany

In recent years historians have made some effort to understand the lives of ordinary people who lived in the past rather than simply concentrating upon war, politics, and the deeds of the rich and famous. However, in the case of Brittany at least, very little is actually known for certain about the lives of people that lived before the beginning of the twentieth century. There are many people in Brittany today who are over a hundred years old, and it is almost certainly true that one could learn more about Brittany's real history by talking to them, than from reading all the available printed material on the subject.

In the fourteen hundreds at least eighty percent of the population lived in the countryside and supported themselves by farming the land. Records suggest that even though Brittany was still essentially a feudal state Breton people at that time were not serfs. In fact, in many ways, the laws that they were living under were more conducive to personal freedom than those that we have today. They appear to have been derived from old Celtic traditions: people did not have the right to own land, but were assigned an area to farm by the local lord; if they wanted to terminate the agreement they had the right to be compensated for any improvements that they had made, or buildings that they had constructed. In exchange for the right to farm, people paid something to the church, something to the local lord, and something to the Duke

It is ingrained in modern mythology that such a life was difficult and squalid, and that common people lived a life constantly under threat from famine and starvation. This idea can only have been formulated by people who have never had the pleasure of farming a few acres of the Breton countryside; a large garden, an orchard, a field of cereals, a few animals, as much free wood as you could wish for, the presence of friends and relatives to help one through hard times.

no mortgage, no traffic, no electric bills, no phone bills, no need to go out to work, no need for planning permission - for many people this is a definition of paradise rather than penury, and yet such appears to have been the lot of the majority of the population at that time.

The major problem with this system was that, to function properly, it required the presence of an upper class dedicated to dividing land out fairly, resolving disputes, and ensuring peaceful relations with neighbouring towns and villages. Predictably, by the time of Anne of Brittany this upper class had become self-serving and obsessed with power and politics. Consequently, many parts of Brittany had been subject to almost a hundred years of intermittent warfare, which must have transformed what should have been an idyllic lifestyle into one of uncertainty and distress.

Anne's marriages to Charles and Louis, brought these disputes to an end and allowed people to resume normal life, and therefore, no matter what has transpired subsequently they were almost certainly welcomed by the vast majority of the people at the time.

Five Years in Brittany: Pierre & Paulette - Moulin Blanc

Pierre grew up in the South West of France where his father was working, but his mother is from Brittany. He started work as a printer but very soon realised that he could not stay enclosed between four walls and "took to the road" with an English musician, to organise a summer "tour". After France, they ended up in Italy, then Sardinia where they met a Norwegian actor with a great idea: to convert an old fishing boat (45ft cutter) back into its original state - a two mast sailing boat. The adventure lasted four years; they sailed from Norway to Italy and back to Norway for chartering. Pierre then returned home for a while, working as a barman, but life was too quiet. He succeeded in getting a job with an oil service company. He worked for twenty years in Norway, the Algerian desert and in the tropical forests of Gabon, and then on a boat sailing round the West African coast. He eventually thought about settling down...but he still needed space and air. Why not run a campsite? He took a management course and training on a campsite in Biscarrosse, where he met Paulette.

Paulette had grown up in the kitchens of her mother's restaurant in Brittany. She naturally

continued the family tradition and created several restaurants. For a break, and to be nearer her daughter and grandchildren living near Biscarrosse, she took the job of restaurant manager of the campsite where she met...Pierre.

Pierre and Paulette, camping, restaurant, Brittany: the result is obvious. Paulette could not stay away long from her region; Pierre had always loved this place where he spent many holidays sailing or visiting his 'Breton' friends that he met abroad.

In 2001 they found a place that needed developing, in Plougonver: restaurant, fishing and camping! In the house walls were removed to create a large room where a bar was installed. It has become a kind of family pub where they welcome you for meals, fish and chips on Friday evenings, and special theme evenings once a month. In the summer there is a marquee on the terrace where you can enjoy the garden and the restful murmur of the stream. The campsite is open all year.

Pierre and Paulette are also very willing to help newcomers solve the small problems that one always encounters when moving to a new country.



Q.: "How can I protect my computer from spam?

Firstly, one must appreciate that an email address is a valuable thing. Protect it and don't hand it out to everyone who asks. It's often a good idea to have several addresses That's why Hotmail is so popular. Lycos.com and Netscape.net are good places to get free email addresses too.

Secondly, NEVER respond to unsolicited messages. Yes, I know they say "Click on this link if you don't want to receive these messages" but all that usually does is announce the fact that you are really there and prepared to pay attention. You'll get even

ISPs are getting wise to the problem and are starting to offer anti-spam filters. This is software that scans incoming messages and blocks out stuff that satisfies certain rules. For instance, if a message has no proper subject line it can be blocked. The drawback with such filters is that they take time to learn the rules and can apply them incorrectly. One of my ISPs provides a filter that merrily blocked important traffic because it didn't like the email address of the sender. It was two days before I realised what was happening. I'll be ready next time.

For those who use POP3 mailboxes almost everyone except Webmail and AOL users - there is another way. Install a spam filtering program that can check your emails before you download them. The better ones can create "Black Lists" of unwanted email addresses and "White Lists" of addresses that should always allow messages through. They can be made to recognise certain words and phrases - no more unwanted viagral

Website Workshop

Last month we looked at browsers, this month we shall be looking at static and dynamic websites.

Q - What is the difference between a static and dynamic website?

A - The difference is the use, or not, of a database. A static site does not use a database and is simply written in HTML (discussed in a previous column). Dynamic sites retrieve the content from a database, thus separating data from design; this means that you can easily add to, or archive, your content without affecting the look and feel of the website.

Q - Who would benefit most from a static website?

A - A static website is best for companies who merely need a presence on the web or are just starting the process of getting online. It's an extended brochure meant to provide only the most important information to customers.

Q - ...and a dynamic site?

A - Ideal for companies who use their site extensively to disseminate information to multiple audiences. Normally, these sites will feature a number of database-driven dynamic sections that interact with the user in order to provide a more functional experience Good examples include real-time stocks and shares information or ticket sales.

Q - What about the cost difference?

A - Static sites are generally cheaper to produce as they are simply pages made up from HTML that rarely changes. The databases of dynamic sites need to be

populated with all the information required and then updated regularly. Therefore the costs are usually much higher.

Winter Vegetables

July is usually a time of plenty in the garden potatoes, tomatoes, courgettes, spinach, peas, blackcurrants, carrots, should all be ready for picking now - and it is easy to forget the times of shortage later in the year. Now is the time to plant many of the vegetable crops that can be harvested during the autumn and winter months:

Carrots: It is traditional to make a late sowing of carrots during the first two weeks of July, with luck they will be ready for picking as young carrots in autumn, leaving time for the main crop to get as big as possible.

French Beans: French beans sown in July will start producing a crop towards the end of August which will continue till the first frost

Lambs' Lettuce (Mâche): This is a salad crop which is worth its weight in gold in wintertime, when it is ready for picking. First sowings can be made in July. The seeds are notoriously slow to germinate, and the young plants can suffer badly in hot, dry summer weather: sow thickly and water frequently.

Brassicas

Brassicas supply the main winter crops. Timing is critical; if you plant too early the plants might flower, if you plant too late, they might not have time to form a vegetable that is worth picking. It may take a few years of experimenting in your particular location before you get it right.

Savoy cabbages (chou de Milan) Plant during the first half of the month for cabbages ready for picking in the winter, and towards the end of the month for cabbages that can be picked next spring.

Turnip: Turnips are one of the easiet vegeta-bles to grow; they can be planted at any time during the month, and will be ready for picking from October onwards.

Swedes: Many people prefer the taste of swede to that of turnip. The plants are slightly harder to grow as they tend to attract more garden pests. They should be weeded

Herb Teas

It is a simple matter to collect and use herbs from the garden for herb teas.

At this time of year they can be used fresh, and if you have a surplus it can be dried and saved for use later in the year.

Mint is the herb most commonly used for tea; other herbs that can be used are sage and verbena (verveine) and you can also use wild plants such as nettle leaves. Later in the year you can pick rose hips from hedgerows for rose hip tea.

Herbs can be dried on trays put out in the sur or tied together in bunches and hung from the ceiling for a few days in a warm, well-ventilated room. They are best stored in paper bags - there is a risk that they will go mouldy if stored in an airtight container unless the drying process has been one hundred percent effective

regularly, watered during dry spells, and thinned so that plants are 6" apart. They also need to be protected from birds by covering them with a piece of wire netting when they are young.

Radishes: Winter radishes are a popular crop in Brittany; grated, they make a valuable addition to winter salads, sliced they are a traditional ingredient in Chinese wok dishes. Large, black-skinned varieties are commonly used. They are grown in the same way as swedes

Chicory

A month by month guide to growing chicory for the winter.

Chicory Month by Month: July

July is the last possible month for sowing chicory - it can be sown on beds from which early potatoes have been harvested.


The aim is to get large, well-formed roots and plants should therefore be thinned, weeded, and watered during dry spells.

arrly cycle of bracken is curious, and worthy of lowest, in the first months of the year no sign can be seen of it, and many wild flowers such as of bluebells, orchids, arum lily and others flourish in the full sunlight; however, as their blooms begin to fade, up come the young bracken fronds, arched over at the top and very tender-a late frost at this stage will kill them, but more will follow. Rapidly over the next few months the delicate bracken fronds will come to resemble young saplings, which exceed the height of an average adult, and their dense coverage provides shelter for numerous birds and animals Then, around the month of August, and often earlier, they all, in one great body, fall over, brought down sometimes by immense amounts of goose grass or brambles, but most often by wind. The fronds then dry out, covering the ground with a uniform layer of mulch, which is extremely good for the soil and conserves it free of weeds, for next Spring's growth. It is very possible to cut off the fallen ferns at the base and use them in the garden on any bare soil as a mulch; bracken has long been valued for its fronds, as they contain a high level of potash which is good for the soil, and is said to help the development of large fruit and flowers.





They will eat rows of beans and strip young cabbage plants of their leaves – if you wish to protect your cabbages, cover them with netting. Unlike in the town, the woodpigeons of the countryside are shy birds, and when walking in your garden you will probably hear them before you see them, as they take off into the air with their distinctively noisy clatter.
